It will be Jean-Paul's first full program year with us sharing the ministry with our children and youth and their families. If you are a parent, I invite you to make it a family priority this fall to have your children and/or youth engaged in Sunday School and/or in one of our youth programs.

There are other pieces of the puzzle falling into place as well this fall. You will be hearing more from Jason Charneski, our Director of Music, about the new Knock Internship in Sacred Music, as the new intern begins in October. As the construction on the office space and third floor comes to a close, construction will also be taking place to create an elevator shaft, and eventually, the installation of an elevator, making our building more welcoming and accessible to all. As we seek to engage the younger members among us, this fall we will introduce a "Text to Give" program, making giving to the church easier and instantaneous. And on October 21, the Mission and Outreach Committee, during coffee hour, invites you to come and learn more about our outreach ministries at our "Transforming Lives" event.


NOLA 2018 MISSION TRIPS

Between both June and August, RPC commissioned 32 high school youth, along with chaperones, to travel to New Orleans on youth mission trips. Once again this year, we sent two groups - thanks to the generous support of the congregation through the Imagine Initiative, as well as the Women's Association, the Mission & Outreach committee, and a few generous angel investors. On both trips we partnered with Rebuilding Together, a terrific group that focuses on home improvements for the elderly, the disabled and veterans. In June, we split into two groups, with one installing floors at a house in the Gentilly Woods neighborhood and the other doing a huge amount of prep work on the exterior of a house in the Bywater neighborhood. In August, the group returned to the Gentilly Woods neighborhood to finish the house we worked on in June and do some major interior work in a house across the street. We worked hard, and we played hard - with tours of the Katrina Museum, beignets in the French Quarter, some AAA baseball, an airboat tour through the swamp, and a great evening at the Rock 'n' Bowl!

In addition to the support and prayers of the church, we particularly thank our non-staff chaperones this year – Heather Miller, Susie Marshall, and Margaret and Jonathan Blum – all gave generously of their summer to be a part of the trip.



Prison Ministry, Helping Hands

PRISON MINISTRY OPPORTUNITIES...



For almost 25 years, members of RPC have been involved in everincreasing, broadening, and deepening ways in work with men and women who are, or have been,

incarcerated and others impacted by the criminal justice system. In that time, our beloved church has become a leader in prison ministry in our Presbytery and beyond as well as outside denominational bounds.

There are many ways members of this church can become involved in this life-changing ministry and can fit it into their own time availability and comfort level. We urge you to consider becoming part of this work.

- Prison Visitation: It all started with a handful of people who had attended the 1994 graduation of 16 men who were students at New York Theological Seminary (NYTS) and incarcerated behind the forbidding walls of Sing Sing prison in Ossining. Joined by others from RPC and outside it, the next year we began monthly meetings with each NYTS class and separate monthly meetings with men who had graduated and were still at Sing Sing. And now we also meet monthly with a different • Leadership Beyond: Because of RPC's creativity and comgroup at Fishkill prison near Beacon.
- Worship: As these graduates, and men from earlier classes, were released, RPC realized it had a ready-made pool of guest preachers who could bring our congregation a vision of a world far removed from Rye, yet spiritually connected with it. Thus began RPC's Church and Justice Service, a worship experience led entirely by NYTS graduates, from Call to Worship through Benediction and including some of the most powerful sermons heard in our church.
- Clothes Closet: Seeing that men who had been in prison up to four decades needed proper business attire to get employment, we created a clothes closet-where congregants donate suits and other clothes they no longer need (or fit).

• Coming Home: Prison ministry doesn't end when an incarcerated person is released. They need support through mentoring, help with resumes and job search, and simply acclimating to life on the outside. RPC provides that through an 18-week program involving not only that support, but also a dinner, to which any congregant is invited, to enable all of us to know and understand one another better. It is a

joyful time of fellowship.

- Rye Writes: Learning that many men and women never receive any correspondence during their years of incarceration, RPC created Rye Writes, enabling members of the congregation to connect with individual inmates via letters written anonvmously by members and sent from the church. Return mail comes to the church addressed to the pseudonym chosen by the congregant, who is then notified by the church "you've got mail".
- mitment to prison ministry, we have led our Presbytery's efforts to expand this ministry to other churches. Seeing what we have done, Brick Church in New York has created a vibrant prison program after meeting with RPC. And men in prison, yearning for education, sought RPC's help in launching Rising Hope, a Certificate in Ministry program modeled after NYTS, now operating in six prisons around New York. Plus we helped in the creation of Hudson Link, a 20year-old, fully accredited, privately funded college program in eight New York prisons and the model for similar programs around the country.


New Member Orientation







School Wide Project: Ducklings

Collaboration between classrooms is a key component to support and drive emergent curriculum experiences at our school. During the 2017-2018 school year, the RPNS students had the pleasure of watching ducklings hatch and grow through the 4H incubation project at Cornell Cooperative Extension!

The eggs were kept in an incubator located in the RPNS art studio for a few weeks. The children observed the eggs with excitement as the ducks developed and eventually hatched right in front of
